1) The Context for Conflict

(vs. 1)

Two is certainly better than one,
but what we will find is that two is
harder than one

³² I would like you to be free from concern. An unmarried man is concerned about the Lord's affairs—how he can please the Lord. ³³ But a married man is concerned about the affairs of this world—how he can please his wife—
³⁴ and his interests are divided. An unmarried woman or virgin is concerned about the Lord's affairs:

1 Corinthians 7:32-35

Her aim is to be devoted to the Lord in both body and spirit. But a married woman is concerned about the affairs of this world—how she can please her husband. ³⁵ I am saying this for your own good, not to restrict you, but that you may live in a right way in undivided devotion to the Lord.

Singleness does not mean
asexuality. A single person has
longings, hormones, temptations;
that's what it means to be human.

It is naïve to imagine a life or
marriage without conflict

Conflict is not the issue, it is
how we deal with conflict that
is the issue

We are reminded that we are sinners when we sow conflict and we are reminded that we are saints when we are quick to resolve conflict. Conflict is a sanctifying work of God.

Avoid the transactional nature of
sexual intimacy

What happens before and after sex is just as important as what happens during sex; otherwise expect conflict.

Unresolved conflict hinders sexual intimacy. Hindered sexual intimacy leads to a search for other avenues of sexual intimacy.

²⁰ Without wood a fire goes out; without a gossip a quarrel dies down. ²¹ As charcoal to embers and as wood to fire, so is a quarrelsome person for kindling strife.

Marital conflict leaves each other
unprotected

We need to protect one another
so that we never live with regret
