(vs. 1-3)

3) An Affirmation of Favouritism

(vs. 8-9)

8 Sixty queens there may be, and eighty concubines, and virgins beyond number;
9 but my dove, my perfect one, is unique the only daughter of her mother, the favorite of the one who bore her.

Marriage is ultimately a decision of favouritism. Out of all the men or women in the world, your spouse chose you!

While there are examples of polygamy among the Israelites in the Old Testament, I believe that Song of Solomon 6:9 marks a cultural paradigm shift and makes an explicit statement in favour of monogamy
